What is Plagiarism


"For purposes of the Stanford University Honor Code, plagiarism is defined as the use, **without giving reasonable and appropriate credit to or acknowledging the author or source, of another person's original work, whether such work is made up of code, formulas, ideas, language, research, strategies, writing or other form(s).** Moreover, verbatim text from another source must always be put in (or within) quotation marks."



Types of Plagiarism

The most common forms of plagiarism are:

1. **Direct Plagiarism** is the **word-for-word transcription of a section of someone else's work, without attribution and without quotation marks**. This is also referred to as clone plagiarism by Turnitin.
2. **Self-Plagiarism** occurs when a student **submits their previous work, or mixes parts of previous works, without permission from all professors involved**. For example, it would be unacceptable to incorporate part of a term paper you wrote in high school into a paper assigned in a college course. Self-plagiarism also applies to submitting the same piece of work for assignments in different classes without previous permission from both professors." This is also referred to as recycle plagiarism by Turnitin.
3. **Mosaic Plagiarism** occurs when a student **borrowed phrases from a source without using quotation marks, or finds synonyms for the author's language while keeping to the same general structure and meaning of the original**. This type of plagiarism is frequently called patch writing and it most frequently occurs **when students fail to paraphrase correctly**. This is a combination of CTRL-C and Find-Replace plagiarism by Turnitin.
4. **Accidental Plagiarism** occurs when a **person neglects to cite their sources, or misquotes their sources, or unintentionally paraphrases a source by using similar words, groups of words, and/or sentence structure without attribution**. This is a combination of Hybrid, Mashup, Aggregator, and Re-Tweet plagiarism by Turnitin.

How to Avoid Plagiarism

Common Knowledge: What You Don't Have to Cite

1. **Your own ideas...**but make **sure they are your own**
2. **Your conclusion...**if you are restating things **you already cited in your paper**
3. **Common knowledge...**this one is a little trickier, how do you decide if something is **common knowledge**?
 - **many scientific and historical facts** fall into this category (Lincoln was assassinated, Einstein originated the theory of relativity)
 - things you would **expect people would already know** (the United States is made up of many ethnic groups)
 - **common sayings, quotes, or folklore** ("ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country")

If you are not sure, ask your teacher or a librarian!

Ways to Avoid Plagiarism

1. **Cite your source**
2. **Include quotations**
3. **Paraphrase** - Paraphrasing is rewriting a source's ideas or information into your own words, without changing its meaning. But be careful—**paraphrasing can slip into plagiarism if done incorrectly.**
4. **Present your own idea**
5. **Use a plagiarism checker**

“किसी दूसरे की भाषा, विचार, उपाय, शैली आदि का अधिकांशतः नकल करते हुए अपने मौलिक कृति के रूप में प्रकाशन करना साहित्यिक चोरी (Plagiarism) कहलाती है। यूरोप में अठारहवीं शती के बाद ही इस तरह का व्यवहार अनैतिक व्यवहार माना जाने लगा। इसके पूर्व की शताब्दियों में लेखक एवं कलाकार अपने क्षेत्र के महारथियों की हूबहू नकल करने के लिये प्रोत्साहित किये जाते थे। (मास्टर्स) साहित्यिक चोरी तब मानी जाती है जब हम किसी के द्वारा लिखे गए साहित्य को बिना उसका सन्दर्भ दिए अपने नाम से प्रकाशित कर लेते हैं। इस प्रकार से लिया गया साहित्य अनैतिक माना जाता है और इसे साहित्यिक चोरी कहा जाता है। आज जब सूचना प्रोद्योगिकी का विस्तार तेजी से हुआ है ऐसे में पूरा विश्व एक ग्लोबल विलेज में तब्दील हो गया है और ऐसे अनैतिक कार्य आसानी से पकड़ में आ जाते हैं।”
